CONTEMPORARY DESIGN GALLERIES *at the* INDIANAPOLIS MUSEUM OF ART

After a three-year, multiphase renovation project, the new contemporary design galleries at the Indianapolis Museum of Art debuts November 21. More than 400 works of art, spanning nearly 10,000 square feet, will be unveiled as part of the IMA's permanent collection. As one of the largest displays of contemporary design in any North American art museum and among the first surveys of recent trends in this dynamic field, the installation is something to celebrate.
